President's Report for Yates CCE 2013

As I conclude my first year as your Board President I marvel at how many things we accomplish and how much influence Cooperative Extension has here in Yates County. It sure has been a productive year. We have a wonderful and very dedicated staff that works very hard to help boost the local economy and the local population by implementing and overseeing many diverse programs. There are so many areas where CCE is involved and making an impact. That is one of the things that has always amazed me is that CCE is such a diverse organization and serves so many people. Our staff is well trained to put their knowledge to work helping people. I would also like to acknowledge our wonderful volunteers. There is so much that so many people do to help our paid staff. They are very dedicated to what they do and are an integral part of our organization. A big thank you to Nicole Landers, our Executive Director, too. She does a great job as the head of our team. Thank you to the Yates County Legislature too for providing local funding which enables us to leverage much more from various other sources. Finally I would like to give a big thank you to our Board of Directors. We have met monthly all year long and they have given tirelessly of their time and expertise. All of what we do is made possible by all of these team members and to everyone I say a big thank you. You are Cooperative Extension in Yates County.

During 2013 Yates County CCE has helped strengthen our community in a number of ways. Here is a sampling of our 2013 highlights:

- October marked the first month of the official start of the Finger Lakes Shared Business Network, comprised of seven county associations sharing services of Finance, Human Resources and Information Technologies
- Successful implementation of an Eat Smart NY Program with 901 participants covering 76 nutrition lessons for making healthy food choices
- Implementation of a healthy eating program for youth with 58 participants applying healthy eating and/or active living behaviors
- Youth Development programming continues to reach more youth within the county to promote healthy lifestyles and confidence building through participation in public presentations, shooting sports, living history, sewing camp, photography workshops, horticultural science, animal science, county and state fairs, and various club activities
- The 4-H program provided high quality, science-based programming to participants of after-school programs in the Dundee and Penn Yan school districts
- The 4-H program partnered with the Yates Council to provide science-based workshops in entomology and photography during after school hours
- In partnership with the Department of Social Services, CCE educators assisted 122 individuals with budget management skills, 21 intensively
- In partnership with Workforce Development, CCE provided education in budget and financial planning to teens in summer employment opportunities.
- 74 local planning and zoning officials, and interested citizens partook in the annual Land Use Leadership Alliance training and increased their knowledge on available tools and funding sources
- 24 concerned citizens participated in a half-day workshop on identifying and managing aquatic invasive species
- In response to local interest, NWNY Dairy and Livestock Program co-sponsored an Anaerobic Biodigester workshop, attracting over 60 participants from the region
- The Finger Lakes Grape Program, in partnership with Martini Vineyards and Finger Lakes Community College, oversaw the first season of classes at the Teaching and Demonstration Vineyard and will harvest the first partial crop from the vineyard this year.
- A Good Agricultural Practices (GAPs) training was held in Yates County, promoting safe handling of fresh produce
- The Cornell Vegetable Program and the HarvestNY team worked with local producers and area markets to strengthen their business relationships
- Master Gardener volunteers presented a successful Yard 'N Garden Day to 79 participants with presentations by experts about companion planting, native plants and climate change
- In partnership with the New York Forest Owners Association, DEC, and future Forest Consulting, the Master Forest Owner volunteers held a woods walk for 49 individuals resulting in 8 landowners receiving site visits and 6 landowners adopting new stewardship plans to improve proper regeneration.
- None of these varied and successful programs would be possible without our dedicated and talented volunteers who give tireless numbers of hours to ensure the quality programming associated with Cornell Cooperative Extension is maintained!
- In partnership with Workforce Development and Keuka Housing Council, over 70 individuals received low cost and no cost energy efficiency tools and tips on how to save money on their electricity bills.



~ Grafting ~

As soil based production continues in tunnels and greenhouses, risk of root-zone diseases, insects, nematodes and soil nutrient deficiencies increase. Grafting, the combination of two separate cultivars into one plant, is one management approach to these challenges.

Grafting in our studies has significantly increased tomato yields. Labor, greenhouse time and materials however increase the cost of grafted transplants. Therefore to be profitable with this technique, a high graft survival rate is required. Key steps for success in the grafting process follow.













Economics of grafting are favorable based on several years of Cornell Vegetable Program research. For example, the estimated cost of a Maxifort (a common rootstock) X Panzer (a popular scion) is \$1.50/plant versus an ungrafted Panzer at \$0.36/plant. With a mean increase of 4.7 pounds per plant, the break-even price required is \$0.24 per pound. Our limited experience with determinate varieties has re-directed us to indeterminate varieties. The indeterminate production system allows for more pruning which harnesses the rootstock vigor. Left unchecked, as in determinate production, excess foliage can actually increase disease incidence.

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





Yates County 4-H Builds Community Connections

4-H programming can be found all over Yates County through efforts that build relationships with partner agencies and collaborators. In 2013, the following connections were created or continued in specific program areas:

- Penn Yan Elementary Afterschool Clubs—4-H offered 5 week photography and animal science clubs to 33 youth.
- Dundee Elementary Afterschool—4-H offered 6 weeks of photography and animal science for 2 age groups reaching 46 youth.
- KAT (Kids' Adventure Time) 4-H offered horticulture education to 19+ youth with social/emotional needs.
- Penn Yan Library—4-H offered horticulture education over the summer to 14 youth in grades K-5.
- Modest Bedient Library, Branchport—4-H offered a 'tween cooking series to 4 pre-teenagers and a horticulture program to 19 youth in grades K-5 during the summer months.
- Rainbow Junction Childcare Center—4-H offered a summer horticulture series to 14 youth in grades K-5.
- Yates County Arts Council—4-H offered 6 weeks of beginner's photography to 6 youth ages 10-15 afterschool.

Eat Smart New York Impacting Lives in Yates County!

Eat Smart New York's (ESNY) goal is to promote health by helping low-income individuals establish healthy eating habits and a physically active lifestyle. Poverty is a risk factor for numerous health problems including heart disease, diabetes, cancer, poor pregnancy outcomes, and obesity. Positive changes in nutrition and physical activity are needed to avoid negative consequences of these health conditions. With your agency's support, our nutrition educators will teach the important connection between nutrition and health to more of the 5,369 residents living at or below the poverty level (12.5%) in Yates County.



What We Do

Participants learn through a series of nutrition lessons how to better feed their families with less money. ESNY graduates improve their skills and knowledge about healthy eating by:

- Increasing vegetable and fruit consumption
- Eating smaller portions and decreasing salts and fats
- Increasing level of physical

Adults

- 100% improved in at least one behavior construct
- **98%** improved in at least one of four nutrition practices
- 74% improved in at least one of four food resource management practices
- **67%** improved in at least one food safety practice

What Our Participants Say

ESNY is a program provided by Cornell Cooperative Extension of Yates County in partnership with the Yates County Department of Social Services, funded by USDA's SNAP Program. This institution provides equal program and employment opportunities.
